Driver E. Holmes (Royal Engineers)

Eric Holmes was born in the early part of 1912 and attended Kildwick school, where he seems to have been quite sporty.

He married in early 1940, perhaps immediately prior to being called-up, and set up home in Wadsworth near Hebden Bridge.

Eric served as a driver with the Royal Engineers, in North Africa; in a campaign that saw the British 8th Army and the German Afrika Corps repeatedly advance and retreat across the deserts of Libya and Egypt^{1,2}. He died on October 3rd 1941, and is buried in the Suez Memorial Cemetery, Egypt³.

He was one of St. Andrew's bell-ringers. When the war was over, a muffled peal was rung in his and Edward Bracken's memory.




Figure 3: Craven Herald (?) newspaper clipping, sadly no date.
