
John William Clough (1887 – 1968)

John William Clough was one of 10 children who lived with his siblings, parents and grandfather in Farnhill.

When he was 13 he was working as a worsted spinner and later would become a weaving overlooker.

It is believed that he served in France and, after marrying, in 1916, had two sons.

John William was a man with many differing interests. He had a passion for Mary Clough. horticulture, was treasurer of the local Paxton Society, was involved with the British Legion, was chairman of the entertainments' committee of Keighley Gala, and was an active member of Glusburn Baptist Church for over 40 years.

Pre-war life

John William Clough was one of 10 children born to Charles Henry Clough, originally from Glusburn, and his wife Jane (nee Brown) of Farnhill. The children were:

Frances Annie; b. 1877 (died in infancy)

George; b. 1879 Annie; b. 1882 Thomas; b. 1883 Mary; b. 1885

John William; b. 1887 Sarah Matilda; b.1890

Nelly; b. 1894 Helen; b. 1900

plus one other, name unknown, who died prior to the 1911 census

By the time of the 1891 census, John William, his five siblings, his parents, and his mother's father, were all living in a four roomed house in Starkey Lane, Farnhill – probably number 27.

The 1901 census revealed an additional member of the family, Helen, who was just six months old when the census was taken.

Note: John William's sister Nelly, born in 1894, died in 1896 and does not appear on any

By this time John was 13 years old. He had left school and was working as a worsted spinner in one of the local mills. Later evidence suggests that this is likely to have been Bairstow's Mill, Sutton-in-Craven.

John William's youngest sister, Helen, died in August 1907 – a month short of her seventh birthday – a fact recorded by Thomas Appleby, the headmaster of Kildwick school, in the school's log book.

"29th This Walker (U.A.) was out of school for about helf an how this afternoon, representing the school at the funeral of Helen Clough, a schola in the Injunt Class up to the Indusance.

She was buried, alongside her sister Nelly and her grandparents, in a family plot in Kildwick graveyard.

In 1912, the 93 year-old Thomas Brown, John William's grandfather (his mother's father) was included in a photograph of "Kildwick and Farnhill Veterans", published in the Keighley News (12/8/1912).

Note: When he died, on 16th January 1915, the Keighley News reported that Thomas Brown had lived in six reigns: George III, George IV, William IV, Victoria, Edward VII, and George V.

It must have been at about this time that John William began what would be a life-long interest in horticulture. Pre-WW1 newspaper reports record that he was a member of the Farnhill branch of the Paxton Society, for allotment and smallholders. At a flower show held in May 1914, John William was among the prize-winners in several classes.

There is no doubt that John William Clough served in WW1, however it has not been possible to say when, where, or how he served – his family believe it was somewhere in France.

No newspaper reports of the period mentioned him as a member of the armed forces, or included his name in any list of the men who were serving.

On the other hand there a number of pieces of evidence that suggest John William was in the village for at least some of the time during the war period.

He is mentioned in several reports of meetings and flower shows organised by the Paxton Society, including: 7/11/1914, 9/7/1915, 4/12/1915 (when he was elected treasurer of the society), 5/8/1916, and 30/8/1918. On 26th October 1918, John William won a whist drive held at Kildwick and Farnhill Institute in aid of soldiers and sailors serving from Woodrow's Mill at Junction.

On 16th September 1916 John William Clough, a weaving overlooker, of 27 Starkey Lane, Farnhill, married Alice Ramsden, a worsted weaver, of 9 Beech Street, Crosshills, in Sutton Baptist Chapel. The marriage was witnessed by John's brother, Thomas, and his sister, Sarah Matilda.

Post-war life

After his war service John William returned to work at Bairstow's Mill, which would be his place of work until he retired.





However he did not return to Farnhill. The 1921 census records John William and Alice living at 8 Aire Street, Crosshills. He is recorded as being an Overlooker at Bairstow's.

While living in Aire Street, the couple had two sons: William Denis (known as Denis), born in 1922, and Benjamin Allan (known as Allan), born in 1924.

The family lived in Aire Street until 1931, they then moved to 61 Main Street, Crosshills. This would be John William and Alice's home for the rest of their lives.

In 1929 John William's mother, Jane, died; his father, Charles Henry, died seven years later, in 1936. They were buried in the same plot in Kildwick graveyard.

Both of John William and Alice's sons married – Allan in 1948 and Denis in 1956.

Alice Clough died on 10^{th} February 1966, at the age of 76; John William died on 14^{th} June 1968, aged 80 years.

During his time in Crosshills John William became involved with various local organisations, particularly Glusburn Baptist Church, Keighley Gala Committee, and the local British Legion. These organisations were mentioned in the obituaries published shortly after his death.

BAPTIST WORKER DIES.—Mr. John William Clough, of 61. Main Street, Cross Hills, died on Friday. He was 80. He was a committee member of the Cross Hills and District British Legion, and was an active member of Glusburn Baptist Church for over 40 years. Prior to his retirement, he was employed by Messrs. T. and M. Bairstow Ltd., as a weaving overlooker. He was a keen gardener. funeral service was at Glusburn Baptist Church, on Tuesday, followed by cremation at Skipton He leaves two married sons,
