
Ernest Gibson (1896 – 1964)

Ernest Gibson, born in Bowling, Bradford, was the illegitimate son of Jabez Gibson and Sarah Ann Barlow.

The couple were never married and Ernest's mother subsequently married William Bulcock, from Eastburn. William had two children of his own and the new family settled in Farnhill.

Ernest seems to have been very much involved in village life and was a member of Kildwick and District Brass Band. He and his step-brother worked in a woollen mill.



During WW1 Ernest probably served in the army and after the war married and made a home in Silsden. He and his wife, who both worked in the textile trade, were very active in the Labour movement. They had two daughters.

Ernest Gibson died suddenly in 1964.

Pre-war life

Ernest Gibson was born on 21st July 1896 in Bowling, Bradford. His birth certificate recorded him as being the son of Jabez Gibson and Sarah Ann Gibson formerly Barlow, however there is no evidence that the couple were actually married.

Note: In 1903 Jabez Gibson married Annie Emily Johnson at All Saints Church, Leeds. On the certificate he stated that he was a bachelor. Jabez and Annie are known to have had at least one child, a daughter called Gladys Helen, born 8th September 1904 in Hunslet, Leeds. She would have been Ernest's half-sister.

From 1920 onwards this family lived in Birmingham area. Jabez died there in 1942, and Gladys Helen in 2003.

By the time of the 1901 census the four year-old Ernest and his mother were living with his mother's parents and siblings, in Hunslet, Leeds. She was recorded as being 35 years old and single.

In 1909 Sarah Ann married the widower William Bulcock, a coal carter from Eastburn. William already had two children: a son, Harry(subsequently a Farnhill WW1 Volunteer), who was just a month younger than Ernest; and a four year-old daughter, Nellie.

The new family settled in Farnhill, where the 1911 census recorded them living at 5 Kirkgate. By this time both Harry and Ernest were 14 and had left school. They were both recorded as being bobbin setters in a woollen mill.

At some point prior to WW1 Ernest became a member of Kildwick and District Brass Band.

Ernest Gibson during WW1

Ernest Gibson's WW1 service records have not survived (70% of the records were destroyed during WW2, in the London blitz of 1940) and there is very little information about when, where, or how he served.


No newspaper reports of the period mentioned him as a member of the armed forces, or included his name in any list of the men who were serving.

Such reports as there are suggest Ernest was in the village perhaps until quite late in the war period:

- 26/2/1915 (West Yorkshire Pioneer) Ernest Gibson was elected to the committee of Kildwick and District Brass Band. (Farnhill WW1 Volunteer Harry Walmsley was elected at the same meeting.)
- 11/8/1916 (West Yorkshire Pioneer) and 12/8/1916 (Keighley News) Ernest Gibson was present when his friend Anthony Whiteoak, of Grange Farm, Kildwick, drowned in a swimming accident on the river Aire. At the inquest, the Coroner said that Ernest had done everything he possibly could to help save his friend. Read the <u>news report from the West Yorkshire Pioneer</u>.
- 22/12/1916 (West Yorkshire Pioneer) Ernest Gibson was one of the coffin bearers at Harry Walmsley's funeral.

There is no doubt that Ernest Gibson volunteered to serve in WW1 – otherwise his name would not have been included in the Farnhill Parish Council Roll of Honour. However, information about his service is slight:

• W.B. Whitham, who lived in Farnhill throughout WW1, recorded in his diary on 21st May 1917:

• On both the 1918 and 1919 electoral rolls for Farnhill, Ernest Gibson of Kirkgate was listed as an absent voter, eligible on account of his military service.

Post-war life

After the war Ernest returned to Farnhill, to live with his mother and step-family at 5 Kirkgate. This is confirmed by the 1921 census which shows him working as a cotton weaver for the Bingley Weaving Company at the "Indistrial Shed" in Farnhill (the former Farnhill Mill).

He lived there until June 1927 when he married Edith Dawson of Silsden, in Silsden Methodist Chapel. Both of his step-siblings attended the ceremony and signed the register as witnesses.

Ernest and Edith made their home in Silsden, living at 8 Albert Square until 1937 before moving to 24 Hothfield Street and, finally, to 20 South View sometime during WW2.

On their marriage certificate both Ernest and Edith were recorded as being employed as cotton weavers. However by the time the 1939 register was compiled, at the start of WW2, when wartime ration cards were being issued, they had transferred their skills to the weaving of "Air Silk Rayon" – which was used in the production of parachutes and barrage balloons.

Note: Ernest's birthdate is incorrect.

Ernest subsequently took work as an attendant at an electricity sub-station.

Both Ernest and Edith were active members of the Silsden branch of the Labour Party, with Ernest eventually becoming its vice-chairman. He was also a committee member of Silsden Co-operative Society, and a member of the Silsden Horticultural Society.

The couple had two daughters: Jean Margaret, born 12th May 1933, who died in 1940; and Betty, who was born on 5th May 1940.

Ernest's step-father, William, died in Farnhill in 1946 and it seems likely that his mother, Sarah Ann, moved to live with Ernest and Edith during the last year or so of her life. She died in 1951.

Ernest Gibson collapsed and died at home on 9th March 1964, and was buried in Silsden New Cemetery, in the same plot as his daughter Jean. He was aged 67.

The following obituary appeared in both the Craven Herald and Keighley News a few days later.

FATAL COLLAPSE. -- Mr. Ernest Gibson, South View Terrace. Silsden. collapsed and died while having lunch at his home on Monday. Aged 67, he went to Silsden from Farnhill upon his marriage and was a weaver until during the last war when he became an electricity sub-He continued this station attendant. occupation with the Yorkshire Electricity Board until his retirement. Mr. Gibson was active in the Labour movement. being a vice-chairman of the Silsden Labour Party and a former delegate to the Keighley Constituency Labour Party. He was also a member of the Management Committee of the Silsden Cooperative Society and a committee member of the Silsden Horticultural Society. He leaves a widow and a daughter.

Postscript

Edith's active involvement with the Labour Party continued until at least the October 1974 general election, at which time she was included on a list of party members. She died on 19th April 1981 and was buried in Silsden New Cemetery, with her husband and daughter, Jean.

Betty Gibson, Ernest and Edith's second daughter, married Graham Gornier in 1965 – somewhere in the Skipton area. It is not known whether they had any children or whether they continued to live in the local area.
