Charles Green (1898 – 1972)

Charles Green was born in Farnhill and had three brothers and three sisters. He attended Kildwick school and later worked at Woodrow's mill, at Junction.

An active member of Kildwick Brass Band and the local Conservative Club, he joined the Prince of Wales (West Yorkshire) Regiment in 1918. He was later wounded, hospitalised and invalided home..

Employed at the bobbin mill in Steeton he married a Silsden girl. The couple, who had a daughter, lived in Silsden for the rest of their lives, where Charles was a milkman and kept poultry.

Charles he had been a widower for nearly six years when he died, in 1972, aged 73.

Pre-war life

The Green family lived at 11 Mary Street, Farnhill. Charles Whiteoak Green, Charles's father, appears to have been from an established Farnhill family; his mother, Janet (nee Beattie), was from Scotland.

Charles was born in Farnhill on 28th August 1898, and baptised in St. Andrew's church six weeks later. He was the youngest of seven children: four boys and three girls.

Charles's mother died in 1904, and was buried in Kildwick churchyard; the inscription on her grave, "Rest after weariness", perhaps suggesting that she suffered a prolonged illness. Charles was only five years old.

Like many of the Farnhill WW1 Volunteers, it seems likely that Charles attended Kildwick school, and in 1908 or 1909 he was included in a photograph of school-age children taken outside the school. It looks like the photograph may have been taken during a pageant and Charles appears to be in a Scout's uniform.

At the time of the 1911 census, taken when he was aged 12, Charles was attending school part-time; for the rest he was employed in "Domestic purposes".

Before the start of the war Charles joined the Kildwick Conservative Club, which opened its premises on Kildwick bridge in 1912, and also the Kildwick and District Brass Band.


Charles Green during WW1

Although Charles Green must have volunteered to serve before the end of January 1916 – otherwise his name would not have been included in the Farnhill Parish Council Roll of Honour – it seems likely, perhaps because of his young age, that he wasn't called to serve until later in the war.

Charles was certainly in the village in November 1916, when he was one of the masters of ceremonies at a dance, held at Farnhill Institute, on behalf of the Kildwick and District Brass Band.

It is clear that Charles was a member of the Prince of Wales' Own (West Yorkshire) Regiment, but it has not been possible to determine the battalion with which he served.

In October 1918 Charles was wounded and hospitalised, as was reported in the Craven Herald on the 18th.



No further details of Charles Green's service are known.

Post-war life

After the war Charles returned to the family home at 25 Starkey Lane, Farnhill. He is recorded as living there on the 1921 census. However, by this time Charles is no longer working for Woodrow's; his job is bobbin maker with John Dixon & Son at the Steeton Bobbin Mill.

On the 7th June 1924, Charles Green married May Gallagher of Silsden. The marriage was witnessed by Clarence, the oldest of her brothers, and Lily Green, the youngest of Charles's sisters.

The couple set up their home at 2 Bright Street, Silsden, but moved to 3 Fairfax Street, Silsden before 1928.

In 1935 the couple moved to 35 South View Terrace, which is where their only child, Barbara, was born in 1937. It would be their home for the rest of their lives.

By the time the 1939 Register was compiled, to enable the issuing of ration cards at the very start of WW2, Charles had left his job at the mill and was employed as a milkman. He later became a poultry dealer and member of the Silsden Co-op management committee.

Note: Fellow Farnhill WW1 Volunteer Ernest Gibson, who also lived in South View Terrace, was also a member of the Silsden Co-op management committee.

Charles and May's daughter, Barbara, married in 1961 and subsequently moved to the Ripon area.

May Green died on 16th June 1966.


Charles Green died on 28th February 1972, aged 73, in Ripon. It seems likely that he moved there after his wife's death, to be closer to his daughter.

POULTRY DEALER DIES Mr. Charles Green, 1 of 35 South View Terrace, Silsden, who died on Monday, Was a Farnhall man who lived at Silsdon for most of his life after he married Miss May Gallagher He was for some years a mem of ber Silsden Co-operative Society management committee and almost to the lend of his life was an enthusiastic poultry keeper. He was employed until retirement at John Dixon and Sons, bobbin mill, Steeton. Mr. Green leaves a daughter.
