# John Hargreaves (1893 – 1961)

John Hargreaves was born in Farnhill and attended Kildwick school.

A lover of sports, he was also a stalwart member of St Andrew's Church, Kildwick – serving as both warden and sidesman. He was also a founding member of the "Kildwick Church Brotherhood".

Apart from his WW1 service, from 1916 until 1919, he worked all his life at Woodrow's Mill in Junction.

After they married, John and his wife lived in Crosshills, where he died in 1961.

### Pre-war life

John Hargreaves was born in Farnhill on 16<sup>th</sup> April 1893 and was baptised at St. Andrew's Church, Kildwick, six weeks later. He was the fifth child, and eldest son, of John and Annie (nee Dean). His father was from Farnhill and his mother from Threshfield.

The 1901 census records John Hargreaves senior as being a "cattle-man", which presumably means he worked on one of the local farms. The family – mother, father and seven children (four girls and three boys) – were living at 10 Main Street, Farnhill; a four-roomed dwelling.

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John's father died, in Farnhill, on 22<sup>nd</sup> February 1902, aged 44, shortly after the birth of the family's last child, a fourth son, Lambert Edward. He was buried in Kildwick graveyard.

Young John attended Kildwick school and in July 1905 he won second prize for the creation of a wild flower bouquet – the first prize was won by his brother Anthony.

Prizes were awarded this afternoon for the best bouguets of garden & wild flowers, made by the children at school. These were won by:Will Hower Bouguet 1st Anthony Hugrener 2" & Hugrene Garden Hower Bouguet 1st Alan Holmer. 2nd Down Body. The flowers were afterwards sent to the hospitals and the sich people in the district.

Despite his young age it appears that John was elected as one of the wardens of Kildwick Church in 1907 and again in 1908. In January 1909 he was one of the members of the Church present at the induction of the new vicar, Rev. J. W. Rhodes.

### KILDWICK.

THE NEW VICAR—The new vicar (Rev J W Rhodes) was formally induced to his living on the 17th by Archdeacon Kilner. The Rev A R Light (vicar of Sutton), the Rev J N Lee (vicar of Cowling), the Rev T H Lowe (vicar of Cononley), the Rev J Berry (vicar of Silsden), and Messrs Tom Appleby, F W Petty, and J Hargraves (churchwardens), Messrs T E Sugden (Kildwick), William Sunderland and E. Longbottom (Farnhill), and F G Peacock and George Bottomley (Orosshills), sidesmen, were present at the service, and a nice little congregation. The Archdeacon, the vicar, and representatives of the clergy and laity proceeded to the door of the church, and the lay representatives passed outside, while the vicar locked the door of the church, and tolled the bell, after which he returned and re-admitted the churchwardens and others, who had gone outside. The vicar to his seat in the chancel.

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He was also nominated as a sidesman in 1909 (Craven Herald, 23/4/1909), and although he was not elected to the role on this occasion, he would be in later years and go on to establish a long association with the church.

By the time of the 1911 census, taken when he was 17, John was working as a warp-twister at Woodrow's Mill. Junction.





John became a member of both Kildwick Old Boys' Football Club and Kildwick Albion Cricket Club, and was elected to the Football Club committee in July 1914 (Craven Herald, 10/7/1914) and the Cricket Club committee in January 1915 (Keighley News, 23/1/1915, below).

# KILDWICK.

ALBION CRICKET CLUB MEETING.

The annual meeting of the Kildwick Albion Cricket Club was held on Friday evening week in the Kildwick and Farnhill Institute, Mr. J. Kitson presiding. It was reported that the club had a balance in hand of 12s. Mr. Feather was re-elected secretary and A. Hargreaves treasurer, and the following were appointed a committee: Messrs. B. Lister, H. Forster, P. Hartley, G. Sunderland, J. Hargreaves, Jack Kitson (captain), and Albert Kitson (vice-captain). Mr. T. Hargreaves, the vice-captain, is now serving in the 6th Battalion West Riding Regiment. Mr. B. Lister was re-appointed groundsman, and Messrs. J. Kitson and F. Pollard were chosen as representatives on the Skipton and District League.



**Note:** The A. Hargreaves mentioned in the above news report as club treasurer is likely to have been Alec Hargreaves, of Kildwick, rather than John's younger brother Anthony. Anthony was, however, a member of the Kildwick Old Boys' Football Club committee.

### WW1 service

John Hargreaves attested his willingness to serve in the armed forces at Keighley on 26<sup>th</sup> November 1915, swearing his oath in front of a local magistrate.

As was usual for men who attested, he was initially accepted into the general army reserve before being assigned to the 11<sup>th</sup> (Reserves) battalion of the Duke of Wellington's (West Riding) Regiment (Private, no. 18009) on 22<sup>nd</sup> January 1916. He then underwent four months of training before being transferred to the 10<sup>th</sup> battalion on 18<sup>th</sup> May 1916 and sent over to France.

The Regimental diary of the 10<sup>th</sup> battalion for September and early October 1916 describes their actions on the Somme, particularly in an area a few miles east of the town of Albert in Northern France. It was here, on 3<sup>rd</sup> October, that John Hargreaves received a shrapnel wound to the head that put him in hospital in Rouen. His injury was reported in the Keighley News on the 14<sup>th</sup>.

#### **FARNHILL**

Mrs. Hargreaves, Main Street, Farnhill, has received intimation that her son, Private John Hargreaves, of the West Riding Regiment, has been wounded in the head by shrapnel. He is at present in a base hospital at Rouen. On Thursday last Mrs. Hargreaves received a letter from her son in which he said "it felt nice to get where he could lie in a bed." He was going on nicely and they need not worry about him. Private Hargreaves has been "somewhere in France" for over five months. He joined the forces in January this year, and his battalion went into the trenches on the Sunday and he was wounded on the following Tuesday. He has two brothers in the Army, Private Charlie Hargreaves (Mechanical Motor Transport Section) and Private Anthony Hargreaves (West Riding Regiment). Private John Hargreaves was very popular in Kildwick and Farnhill.

**Note:** Both Charlie Hargreaves and Anthony Hargreaves were also included on the Farnhill Parish Council list of WW1 Volunteers.

He was out of action for three weeks and rejoined his battalion on 26<sup>th</sup> October 1916.

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In November 1917 the 23<sup>rd</sup> Division of the British Army, of which the 10<sup>th</sup> battalion Duke of Wellington's Regiment was a part, was relocated from France to Northern Italy.

John Hargreaves' service record indicates that he spent the time between 29<sup>th</sup> May and 3rd June 1918 in field hospitals. Although the nature of this illness or injury was not made clear it is not likely to have been serious.

After the end of the war John remained with the army in Italy for a number of months. He was returned to the UK in March 1919 and finally discharged on 2<sup>nd</sup> April.

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## Post-war life

Even while he was still serving in Italy John was elected sidesman of St. Andrew's Church, Kildwick (Craven Herald 13/4/1918).

On returning home, John appears to have wasted little time in resuming his pre-war life in Farnhill. He returned to his old job at Woodrows', where he would spend the rest of his working life and, early in May 1919, was elected to the committee of the newly reformed Kildwick Old Boys' Football Club (Keighley News, 9/5/1919).

# KILDWICK & FARNHILL.

Old Boys' Football Club.—A general meeting was held in the Kildwick and Fambill Unionish. Club on Friday evening. Mr. T. Appleby presided over a large attendance. In his opening remarks the Chairman dwelt on the history of the Club, which was formed in 1998 from the old boys" of the Kildwick day and Sunday Schools and carried on first in the Keichler. Schools, and carried on first in the Keighley Junior League, and then in the second and first Keighley League where it did fairly well. When war broke out it was thought best to suspend the Club during hostilities, as many of suspend the Club during hostilities, as many of the members had joined the Colours. With the exception of one the whole of the ferby registered playing members of 1912/14 have seen service, six having ded for their country, many others having been wounded. A vote of condolence with the relatives of those who have died was passed by the meoting. The treasurer's report showed a balance in hand of about £4. A suggestion had been made from outside that one good Football (hib should be formed for the district comprising Saften, Kildwick, Crosshills, etc., instead of a few small clubs as hitherto, but this received no favour with the meeting. It was generally thought that the Club should carry on as before the war, both in memory of the old boys who have talken, and also to keep alive the sporting sprittin the and also to keep alive the sporting spirit in the district. The Club was raised in the first close on this principle, and the meeting generally approved of this, and it was decided to join the Keighley League for the next season. The following officers were elected:—President the Rev. C. E. Hodge, Vican of Kildwick; dicepresidents, Messrs, J. E. Walker T. R. Sngen, I. J. Nelson, W. Fearnley, W. Bant H. J. Appropriate States; secretary, Mr. A. D. A. Payson; treasurer, Mr. P. Slack; committee, Messrs, P. Pollard, J. Hargreaves, B. Holmes, W. Dison, J. Tilotson, S. Holmes, C. Peake, and J. Burston, and also to keep alive the sporting spirit in the LOW'S. 

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In the 1921 census, John is recorded as living with his mother and various siblings, and working as a Cotton Loomer and Twister at Woodrow's Mill.


He also rejoined Kildwick Albion Cricket Club. In the 1922 season, the year in which the team won the Wilberforce Cup, he stood as the team's home umpire.

John's mother Annie died on 22<sup>nd</sup> March 1924 and was buried in Kildwick churchyard, with her husband. (Two of John's sisters, Edith Eleanor and Sarah Frances, neither of whom married, would later be buried in the same family plot.)

On Easter Sunday, a month after his mother's death, the family presented a pulpit cloth to the Church in memory of John (senior) and Annie (Craven Herald 25/4/1924).

## KILDWICK.

#### VICAR AND GOOD FRIDAY EMPLOYMENT.

The usual Eastertide services were held at St. Andrew's Church last week-end. On the morning of Good Friday a service for children was held, and in the afternoon the Rev. A. W. Armitstead (rector of Marton) conducted a three hours' service. In the evening the Rev. C. E. V. Hodge (vicar of Kildwick) gave an address on "The Man of Sorrows," illustrated by lantern slides showing the last hours of the Saviour. In the course of his address the Vicar said he regretted to see that several of the factories in the district were not closed. This was a great error, as it kept people away from worship on a day which should be given up to oblation and prayer. The offertory was for the Bishop of Jerusalem's Mission to the Jews in Palestine.

On Easter Sunday a large number of communicants attended the two early morning services and also the Eucharist. The interior of the Church had been beautifully decorated with lilies and daffodils. The family of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Hargreaves. Farnhill, had presented a pulpit cloth to the Church and, after the singing of the processional hymn, this was dedicated by the Vicar "to the Glory of God and in memory of John and Annie." The cloth is of black leather and in the centre is a cross of white and gold, and embossed in gold round the cross are the words "All power is given unto me in Heaven and in earth. Go ye therefore and teach all nations." The service concluded by the choir singing the "Te Deum" at the altar rails. There was a large congregation at evensong, special music comprising the anthem "Glorious is Thy Name, Almighty God." The whole of the services on Sunday were conducted by the Vicar of Kildwick (Rev. C. E. V. Hodge) to whom, as is usual on this day, the offertories were given.

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John and his siblings continued to live at 10 Main Street, Farnhill, until John married Sarah Elizabeth Wagstaff at St. Thomas' Church, Sutton-in-Craven, on 13<sup>th</sup> December 1926. They set up home at 9 Main Street, Crosshills.

In 1928 John became a founder member of Kildwick Church Brotherhood, a men's society connected to the church, and there are numerous news reports that mention him in connection with this group throughout the 1930s.

During WW2 John Hargreaves served as an ARP warden, as was recorded on the 1939 Register entry for 9 Main Street, Crosshills.



John Hargreaves died on 22<sup>nd</sup> December 1961, aged 68, and was buried in St. Thomas' churchyard, Sutton-in-Craven.

A few days later the following obituary appeared in the Craven Herald (29/12/1961)

John Hargraves, 9, Main Street, Crear Hills, died on Friday at the age of 68. A native of Farahili he lived there until his marriage when he moved to Cross Hills. He spent all his working life at the Junction Mills of J. Woodrow and Sons, working there altogather 58 years. He was given a gold watch on reaching 50 years service and he retired about four years age. Mr. Hargreaves served with the Duke of Wellington's Regiment through the first World War and was twice wounded. He had a lifelong association with Kildwick Parish Church and served for many years as a sidesman. The Church Brotherhood also betweeted him, and he was a founder massive and a good worker for the Brotherhood like loved outdoor sports, and was ectively interested in the Kildwist Chibes. Club.
