# Harry Pollard (1894 – 1971)

Harry Pollard was born in Farnhill into a large family – his parents would have ten children altogether. On the death of his mother, when he was two years old, Harry went to live with his father's sister and later he attended Kildwick school and worked in the woollen industry.

Active in village life, although Harry signed on with a reserve battalion of the Duke of Wellington's Regiment, a medical examination, in 1914, revealed that he was unfit for military service and he was discharged.

He married his cousin in 1917, and it is thought possible that Harry may have seen some active service late in the war.

He and his wife, who had just one daughter who survived infancy, lived in Bradley, where Harry worked at Green's mill. He died in 1971 and is buried in the graveyard of Bradley church.

# **Pre-war life**

Harry Pollard was born in Farnhill on 28<sup>th</sup> November 1894.

His father was Theodore Pollard, born Farnhill in 1854; his mother, Priscilla, born in Glusburn, also in 1854, was the illegitimate daughter of Margaret Brown – who married James Walmsley in 1856.

Harry was born to an already large family. Theodore and Priscilla would have a total of 10 children altogether:

Priscilla Pollard died, in Farnhill, on 24<sup>th</sup> February 1897 and was buried in Kildwick churchyard three days later. She was aged 42 or 43; Harry was two years old.

The 1901 census gave the family's address as 42 Main Street, Farnhill. However, Harry was not living at that address. He was living at 61 Main Street with his paternal aunt Sophia Annie; his uncle, Binns Hartley; and his cousin, John William Hartley.

There is evidence that Harry attended Kildwick school.

Harry was still living with his aunt and uncle at the time of the 1911 census, but by this time the household also included Binns and Sophia Annie's son, John William, his wife, Liza, and their one year-old daughter, Annie.

He was recorded as being 16 years old and employed as a warehouseman at a worsted manufacturer.

Binns Hartley was a member of Kildwick Brass Band and it is likely that Harry followed his uncle into the band.

Harry also appears to have been a member of the Kildwick Albion Cricket Club team that won the local league Second Division cup in 1913.

#### **WW1 service**

On 12<sup>th</sup> October 1914, Harry Pollard signed on as a Private (no. 2833) with the 6<sup>th</sup> Reserve battalion Duke of Wellington's (West Riding) Regiment.

This was a territorial unit, but on attesting he signed his name to the statement:

*I*... do hereby agree ... to accept liability, in the event of a national emergency, to serve in any place outside the United Kingdom ...

With the war two months old, and German forces deep within France and Belgium, it seems unlikely that Harry could have imagined his service would be limited to home soil.

Extract from Harry Pollard's WW1 service records Used under licence from the National Archive Just a month later, however, on 13<sup>th</sup> November 1914, Harry was discharged from the army on medical grounds, suffering from varicose veins.

A medical examination, held at Skipton on 31<sup>st</sup> October, revealed that he:

Had slight varicosity of right leg when enlisted but it has become aggravated since then and now causes him some discomfort.

and later:

After being stood on his feet for an hour the veins ... stand out very prominently ...

The report of the medical board concluded by stating that Harry had been advised to have an operation, which he declined, and consequently they recommended that he be:

Discharged as permanently unfit.



His refusal to have an operation was described as "unreasonable".

This is the full extent of any documentary evidence of Harry Pollard's WW1 military service. However, it seems likely that he subsequently re-enlisted as a volunteer.

In the West Yorkshire Pioneer of 24<sup>th</sup> December 1915 there was a report on how the membership of Kildwick Brass Band had been depleted by men joining the Colours. The piece ended with a list of the members of the band who had joined up, which included Harry Pollard.

The list identifies one man as "discharged", but this designation is not applied to Harry Pollard – which suggests that he was serving at this time.

Harry's name was recorded on Farnhill Methodist Chapel's Roll of Honour, unveiled on 9<sup>th</sup> July 1916, which also includes the names of his brothers – John, Frank and James.

John and Frank Pollard were both serving with 2/4 Yorks & Lancs Regiment. James was serving with Duke of Wellington's (West Riding) Regiment (Private; no. 241427).

Two men called Harry Pollard served with Duke of Wellington's (West Riding) Regiment. One of these, Private no. 241217, has a service number not dissimilar to that of Harry's brother, James. Could it be that Harry rejoined at the time his brother James signed on ? Unfortunately, there is no further information available concerning Private no. 241217, Harry Pollard, to indicate whether or not he was from Farnhill.

At the end of 1916 a memorial service was held in the Methodist Chapel for Joseph Green and Harry Walmsley, both casualties of the war and former pupils of the Sunday School. During the service the names of all the men associated with the church who had left the village to join the forces were read out – including Harry Pollard.

Whether or not he was a member of the forces, Harry Pollard was certainly in the local area in May 1917 as, on the 19<sup>th</sup>, he married his cousin, Eleanor Walmsley of Bradley, at the Methodist Chapel, Grange Road, Skipton. On the marriage certificate Harry gave his occupation as Motor Driver.

# **Post-war life**

Harry and Eleanor set up home at 4 Skipton Road, Bradley.


The couple's first child, Mary, was born in the last quarter of 1918 but sadly died before the end of the year. A second child, Margaret, was born on 24<sup>th</sup> April 1920.

Late 1918 also saw the death of Harry's uncle, Binns Hartley, one the few people from Farnhill whose death was definitely attributable to the Spanish Flu epidemic.

DEATH OF MR. BINNS HARTLEY.— A well-known Farnhill resident, Mr. Binns Hartley died on Satufday from influenza. Mr. Hartley had not been well for sometime. He was for many years in the employ of Messrs. P. Green and Co., Bradley, and was known in all the neighbouring villages by reason of his breezy and unconventional manner. He was for a number of years an energetic member of Kildwick Brass Band, and was also a vice-president of the Institute.

The 1921 census records the Pollard family living in Bradley, where Harry was employed as a Motor Driver, working for Peter Green & Co.

In 1924 the family moved from 4 Skipton Road, Bradley, to number 3. They lived there until 1929, when they moved to 2 Hill Crest.

Despite having moved out of the village it appears that Harry kept up his membership of Kildwick & Farnhill Institute into the 1930s. The project has seen records of him paying membership fees of 7/6d each year for 1937 to 1939.

The 1939 Register, created when ration cards were being distributed at the start of WW2, recorded the family of three living at 2 Hill Crest. It also notes that Harry was a member of the Auxiliary Fire Service of Skipton Rural District Council.

Harry's wife, Eleanor, died on 21<sup>st</sup> June 1956.

Harry continued to live at his home in Bradley, with his unmarried daughter, Margaret. He died, at home , on 30<sup>th</sup> October 1971, and was buried in Bradley cemetery a few days later. He was aged 76.


