# Ephraim Sharpe (1876 – 1945)

Ephraim Sharpe, born in Halifax, lived with his widowed mother and siblings in the Sutton Mill area of the village of Sutton in Craven. By the age of 15 he was working in a local woollen mill.

He married in 1902 and he and his wife would have seven children. They lived, firstly, at Kildwick Grange and then in Farnhill, where Ephraim became known as a baker of oatcakes and a member of the chapel choir.

Records show that Ephraim was in the RAF between October 1918 and February 1919 when he was then discharged.

Returning to Farnhill, and his former occupation as a baker, the business seems to have expanded as his younger sons sold muffins and crumpets in the local villages.

Ephraim Sharpe died in 1945 – when four of his sons were serving with the forces. His wife and extended family continued to live in Farnhill.

## **Pre-war life**

Ephraim Sharpe was born on 6<sup>th</sup> February 1876 in Shibden, Halifax.

He was the fourth child, and third son, of Eli Sharpe, born in Haworth in 1847, and Ann (nee Holdsworth), born in Bingley in 1842. The couple were married at St. Paul's Church in Denholme, on 14<sup>th</sup> September 1868.

It is unclear when Eli Sharpe died (it has proved impossible to locate a registration of his death) but on the 1891 census, by which time the rest of the family were living in the Sutton Mill area of Sutton in Craven, Ann Sharpe was recorded as being a widow. Ephraim was recorded as being a mill hand in a worsted mill. He was aged 15.

Ann Sharpe died on 6<sup>th</sup> January 1896, at Sutton Mill, and it may have been this that led to the breakup of the family.

On the 1901 census, Ephraim was recorded as living as a boarder, in the home of a widow, in Keighley.

On 28<sup>th</sup> September 1902 Ephraim Sharpe, of Keighley, married Clara Hartley, of Kildwick Grange, at Sutton Baptist Chapel. The marriage was witnessed by Ephraim's younger sister, Margaret Ann, and by Clara's brother, James.

The Hartley family were originally from Cowling, where Clara's father Joseph had been a baker and a greengrocer. They had moved to Kildwick Grange some time after the 1891 census, and Joseph had established himself there as a farmer.

Children came to the new family at regular intervals: the first three were born at Kildwick Grange, when Ephraim and Clara were presumably living with Clara's family; a further four children followed after they had moved to Farnhill. The children were:

- James Ernest; b. 13/4/1903
- Joseph Clifford; b. 27/7/1906
- Myra; b. 17/11/1908
- Leslie Granville; b. 27/1/1911
- Kenneth Hartley; b. 9/2/1913
- Cecil William; b. 24/7/1914
- Stanley Gordon; b. 21/5/1919

By the time of the 1911 census Ephraim, Clara, Clara's parents, and the couple's three children (James Ernest had died in 1909) were living in Mary Street, Farnhill – probably at number 2. Ephraim was a baker of oatcakes and employed both his wife and his father-in-law as assistants.

**Note:** The 1911 census was the first when the forms were completed by the head of each household rather than by official enumerators employed for that purpose. This resulted in a number of interesting and/or humorous errors.

When Ephraim completed the form for the Sharpe household he erroneously filled in the section intended only for people born in a foreign country. He reported that he had been born in Halifax but was a "British Subject by parentage".

An error ? Or perhaps Ephraim really thought that Halifax was a foreign country !

Although he was a lifelong Baptist, between 1911 and 1918 Ephraim paid rent for a private pew in Farnhill Methodist Chapel. The reason behind this is not known – certainly none of the children were baptised there. He also became a member of the chapel choir.

The Kildwick School pupil admissions records for 1918 to 1931 (the only years for which records have been found) record the attendance of Ephraim and Clara's son Cecil W. from 27/8/1917 (aged 3 years, 1 month) to 27/7/1928 – when he left having reached the age of 14. (There is no record of Stanley's admission, but a page is missing from the records covering 1922 and 1923, which is most likely when Stanley would have started.)

### WW1 service

There can be no doubt that Ephraim Sharpe volunteered to serve in WW1, before February 1916 – otherwise his name would not have been included in the Farnhill Parish Council Roll of Honour. However the only reference that has been found to him on active service relates to a short period, between 23<sup>rd</sup> October 1918 and 24<sup>th</sup> February 1919, when he was in the RAF.

A single page document exists, clearly relating to Ephraim Sharpe, aged 42, of Mary Street, Farnhill. This appears to record him joining the services for the first time – sections intended for use when a man was joining the RAF from another branch of the services, or where there had been prior service in the RFC, were left blank. Interestingly, however, Ephraim's rank was recorded as "Private Class 2"; this was a designation known to have been used by the RFC to indicate a Driver, but not used by the Army, Navy or RAF.

**Note:** The RAF was formed on 1<sup>st</sup> April 1918: merging the Royal Flying Corps (RFC), previously part of the Army; and the Royal Naval Air Service (RNAS), part of the Navy. Personnel transferring to the RAF from either of the older air services retained their original ranks until 15<sup>th</sup> September 1919.

This document records that Ephraim was discharged from the RAF, at Blandford Forum, on 24<sup>th</sup> February 1919.

# **Post-war life**

Ephraim Sharpe returned to the village just in time for the birth of his youngest child, Stanley Gordon, on 21<sup>st</sup> May 1919.

The 1921 census records the family – Ephraim, Clara and their 6 children – living in Mary Street. Ephraim was a self-employed baker of oatcakes; a return to his pre-war career. The 1931 issue of the Craven Almanac confirms this and notes that he specialised in the making of havercakes.

**Note:** Havercakes were traditional oatcakes – 'haver' meaning oat in Old Norse. Interestingly "The Havercake Lads" was the regimental nickname of the 1st Yorkshire West Riding Regiment in the nineteenth century. Haver is possibly the root of the word 'haversack', a backpack which was part of a soldier's equipment and probably used for carrying a ration of oatmeal.

Ephraim's business must have expanded as, according to a member of the family, his younger sons were often employed to sell muffins and crumpets around the villages – sometimes as far as Bradley.

By this time the family had moved to number 4 Mary Street, where an extension was built to house a kitchen and bathroom. Later, from the mid-1930s, some of the family would also occupy number 12.

In 1936, Ephraim's son Kenneth Sharpe appeared in a photograph of Kildwick Athletic football club that was included in a series of photo-cards issued by Ardath Tobacco Company.

Ephraim Sharpe died suddenly on 11<sup>th</sup> May 1945. He was aged 69.

# Postscript

Clara, his wife, and various members of the Sharpe family continued to live in Mary Street and elsewhere in Farnhill for a number of years. Clara died in Sutton-in-Craven, on 1<sup>st</sup> February 1959.

Most of Ephraim and Clara's children are known to have married and had children.

Three of the weddings took place at Farnhill Methodist Chapel. The last of these was the marriage of Leslie Granville Sharpe to Joan Margaret Lowther on 20<sup>th</sup> February 1965.
