Peter Slack (1892 – 1975)

Richard Slack, a gamekeeper, did not live long enough to witness the horrors of World War 1 but his wife, Lily, would have many an anxious moment as, one after the other, four of her sons volunteered to serve.

Peter, her fourth son, was born in the area known as Silsden Moor and, after the family moved to Farnhill, he attended Kildwick School, where it appears he was an above average scholar.

As a young man he was on the management committee of the Institute and acted as treasurer.

Peter Slack became a corporal in the West Yorkshire Regiment and served in France. At the end of the war he returned to Farnhill becoming, again, very much involved in village life when he was appointed secretary to Farnhill Parish Council and treasurer to Kildwick Old Boys' Football Club.

After marrying and living in Keighley he worked for Keighley Corporation Waterworks and he and his wife had two children – a son who died when he was eighteen, and a daughter who remained unmarried.

Peter Slack died, aged 83, in 1975.

Pre-war life

Peter Slack was born on 3rd January 1892, the fifth child (and fourth son) of Richard Henry Slack, a gamekeeper, originally from Skipton, and his wife Lily (nee Catterall), a school teacher, who was from Bolton in Lancashire. They married in 1885 and had seven children, all of whom were born at Stake Hill on Silsden Moor, an area on the hills between Silsden and Bradley:

Richard Henry Slack died in 1899 and it seems likely that it was after this that the family moved to 3 Mary Street, Farnhill, which is where they were living at the time of the 1901 census.

Note: A member of the family has told the project that the children were unhappy at the move from Silsden Moor, which provided many opportunities for play, to the more built-up environment of Mary Street and were far happier when the family later moved to Heather Cottage, which backs on to Farnhill Moor.

The census recorded that Lily was "living on her own means" – probably working as a private tutor – and the two eldest boys, Richard (aged 14) and William (aged 13), were both employed as spinners in a woollen mill.

He may even have considered teaching as a possible future career.

By the time of the 1911 census however, the 19 year-old Peter Slack was working as a clerk in the office of a cotton manufacturer.

It was probably around this time that he joined Kildwick and Farnhill Institute.

WW1 service

It is certain that Peter Slack saw service with the army in France during WW1, but when his service started is unclear. Local news reports recorded him as being present in the village until October 1916.

He certainly attended the annual meeting of Kildwick and Farnhill Institute in October 1914, when he was elected to the management committee (Keighley News, 17/10/1914). At the next annual meeting Peter delivered the treasurer's report and was appointed to a committee looking into the possibility of creating a scheme to provide "comforts" for men from Farnhill who were serving with the forces (Keighley News, 16/10/1915). He also gave the treasurer's report at the 1916 meeting (West Yorkshire Pioneer, 20/10/1916), when he was again elected to the committee.

The British army WWI medal rolls and associated index cards provide a substantially complete record of the men who served in the army. They suggest that only one man called Peter Slack served in that period. However, the cards and roll do not provide sufficient information to definitively identify a particular individual – they do not include a home address, occupation, or date of birth for example. However *if* we assume that the sole extant medal card and roll entry does indeed refer to the Peter Slack of Heather Cottage, Farnhill, it is possible to provide a fragmentary account of his WW1 career.

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Extract from the WW1 Medal Roll for the West Yorkshire Regiment Used under licence from the National Archive Corporal Peter Slack began his military service with the 16th battalion (1st Bradford) West Yorkshire Regiment which, from March 1916 to February 1918, was stationed in France.

After the 16th battalion was disbanded, Peter spent February and March 1918 attached to the 3rd Entrenching battalion.

Note: Entrenching battalions were short-lived units formed early in 1918, when a reorganisation of the army in France led to a temporary surplus of infantry manpower. These battalions were put to use in improving the existing defences in anticipation of a German offensive. They were disbanded in April 1918.

Peter subsequently served with 15/17th battalion, which was formed by the merging of the 15th and 17th battalions in December 1917.

His active service ended on 14th February 1919 (the only date we can be sure of), when he was transferred to the Class Z reserves. This reserve contingent consisted of discharged, previously enlisted soldiers. The Z Reserve was abolished in 1920.

Peter Slack subsequently received the British War Medal and Victory Medal in acknowledgement of his war service.

Post-war life

On his discharge from the army Peter Slack returned to Heather Cottage in time to be included on the electoral roll for Autumn 1919, compiled earlier in the year.

On 1st March 1919 Peter's brother William also returned to Farnhill, after nine years serving in the Merchant Marine. However tragedy stuck and William died of influenza on the 16th, after being ill for nine days. Peter reported the death.

William was buried in Kildwick graveyard, in the same plot as his father.

Peter seems to have become almost immediately involved in village life. On 15th April 1919 he was appointed as secretary to Farnhill Parish Council.

Parish Council.—The first meeting of the new Council was held in the Institute on Tuesday evening. Mr. W. A. Brigg was unanimously reelected chairman. Mr. W. E. Biggs was elected vice-chairman. Mr. T. Appleby resigned the position of clerk, and Mr. Peter Slack was appointed successor. Finance Committee elected were Messrs. P. G. Baldwin, W. E. Biggs, and A. Ellis ; Lighting—Messrs. T. Latham, W. Greën, and T. Wrathall.—After a discussion on housing Mr. George Holliday, from the Ex-Soldiers and Sailors' Association, gave his views on "Smallholdings."

Note: The minutes of Farnhill Parish Council recorded that he was employed at a salary of £5 per annum.

A little over a fortnight later he became treasurer of the newly-reformed Kildwick Old Boys' Football Club.

On 28th September 1920 Peter Slack married Mary Whitham, of Silsden, in Silsden Wesleyan Chapel. The couple set up home in Keighley, at 6 West Bank.

In the 1921 census Peter was recorded as working as a clerk in Keighley Town Hall, for Keighley Corporation Waterworks. He would eventually become its Superintendent of Distribution.

Peter and Mary had two children. A son, Derek, born 27th April 1925; and a daughter, Mary, born 25th November 1930.

Both the children were born when the family were living at 6 West Bank, Keighley, but by 1933 they had moved the short distance to number 2.

On 6th January 1936, tragedy struck the Slack family when Peter's sister, Martha Ann, was found dead of gas poisoning at her home, The School House, in the village of Thorne near Doncaster, where she was headmistress of the local school. According to the report of the inquest into her death, printed in the Craven Herald (10/1/1936), she had previously suffered a "nervous breakdown" and had been treated at a nursing home in Bristol for "delusions". Returning a verdict of suicide, the coroner said "It seems that she could not face another day's work." Martha Ann (known as Sissie) was buried in the plot adjacent to her father and brother, William.

By the time the 1939 Register was compiled at the start of WW2, to enable ration cards to be issued, the Slack family had moved to 92 Braithwaite Road, Keighley; it would be Peter and Mary's home for the rest of their lives. Peter was listed as a waterworks superintendent and an ARP warden at the waterworks.

A second tragedy struck the family in 1943 when Peter and Mary's son, Derek, died aged 18.

Peter Slack died, of heart disease, in Airedale Hospital, on 27th May 1975; he was aged 83. The death was reported by his daughter, Mary, who was at the bedside.

Postscript

After Peter's death his wife, Mary, continued to live at 92 Braithwaite Road, Keighley, until she died on 11th April 1977 at the age of 81.

Peter and Mary's daughter, Mary, did not marry. She died, in Keighley, in December 1993.

Many of Peter's siblings married and had children, and their descendants are known to be still living in the local area.
