John Robert Thornton (1895 – 1959)

John Robert Thornton was born in Farnhill and was the son of a boatman who worked on the canal.

When John was 16 he was working as a doffer in a cotton mill and later he too became a boatman.

Serving with the Machine Gun Corps during WW1, he was injured at the Battle of Messines in 1917.

After the end of the war, John returned to his job on the canal and married in 1921. He and his wife had three children.

John re-joined the army in 1923, serving for four years.

He and his family lived for a time in Skipton but returned to Farnhill where he died in 1959.

Pre-war life

John Robert Thornton was born in Farnhill on 17th February 1895 and baptised at St. Andrew's Kildwick six weeks later. He was the second child and only son of Walter Thornton, a canal boatman on the Leeds – Liverpool canal, and Dora (nee Hill) who was originally from Brimington, near Chesterfield.

The 1901 census recorded the family living in The Arbour. In addition to John there were two daughters: Hilda (aged 8) and Doris (aged 1). A third daughter, Ada, had been born in 1897 but died less than a year later. The family was completed with the birth of two further girls: Hannah, born in 1903; and Gladys, born in 1905.

John's mother, Dora, died in September 1907 and this may have precipitated a house move for the family from The Arbour to Kirkgate, which is where they were reported as living on the 1911 census. John, aged sixteen, was recorded as working as a doffer in a cotton mill, although sometime before the end of 1915 he would take up his father's occupation as a canal boatman.

WW1 service

John Robert Thornton attested his willingness to serve in the armed forces on 11th December 1915, swearing his oath in front of local magistrate James Bairstow at Crosshills (the same day as another of the Farnhill WW1 Volunteers, Harry Walmsley).

As was usual for men who attested, he was initially accepted into the general army reserve before being assigned to the 11th (Reserve) battalion of the Duke of Wellington's (West Riding) Regiment (Private, no. 18446) on 26th January 1916. He then underwent four months of training before being transferred to the Machine Gun Corps (MGC) on 9th May 1916 (Private, no. 35084).

John's name was recorded on Farnhill Methodist Chapel's Roll of Honour, unveiled on 9th July 1916 (see later).

On 31st December 1916 a memorial service was held in Farnhill Methodist Chapel for Farnhill WW1 Volunteer Harry Walmsley, who had died of wounds earlier that month. At the end of the service Rev. Woodfield read out a "list of those connected with the church at Farnhill who had gone to fight for King and country" (Keighley News, 6/1/1917). The list included John Robert Thornton, who had been sent over to France with 195 Company MGC on 12th December 1916.

195 Company MGC joined the British army's 25th Division which, together with other British and ANZAC units, took part in the Battle of Messines in June 1917. The target of the offensive was the Messines Ridge, a natural stronghold southeast of Ypres. The attack started, famously, with the simultaneous detonation of 19 underground mines, totalling 600 tons of explosive, underneath the German lines at 3am on the morning of the 7th. The offensive continued until the 14th.

It is highly likely that John Robert Thornton participated in this battle as on the 11th he was hospitalised with gunshot wounds to the back.

His father was notified of the incident with the standard sombrely worded despatch from the War Office that began "I regret to have to inform you ..." and ended "I am to express to you the sympathy and regret of the Army Council." In this case, however, it seems that the concern was misplaced as John left hospital on the 17th and returned to his unit.

John was hospitalised again on 31st October 1918 (reason unknown) and on his discharge was immediately given leave in the UK. He was supposed to return to duty on 24th December but overstayed his leave by four days – for which he was deducted five days pay.

Post-war life

After the war John returned to the family home at 3 Kirkgate, Farnhill, and to his old job as a canal boatman.


On 14th February 1920 John married 21 year-old Carrie Foster, of Settle, at Christ Church Skipton. The marriage was witnessed by John's oldest sister, Hilda, and by Carrie's youngest brother, Harry.

On the marriage certificate John gave his address as Hird's Yard, close to the canal basin in Skipton, although he was still registered on the electoral roll in Farnhill.

The following year, on 22nd February 1921, the couple's first child Gladys was born in Settle. A second child, Charlie, was also born in Settle, in 1925, by which time both John and Carrie were on the electoral roll in Skipton.

The 1921 census records the family living at Well Hill, Settle. At this time John wasout of work but gave his previous occupation as Labourer for a limestone quarrying company based in Horton-in-Ribblesdale.

On 27th June 1923 John rejoined the army, signing on for a four year term with 6th battalion Duke of Wellington's Regiment (Private, no. 4606760). He gave his address as Waller Place, Skipton, and his occupation as a labourer.



John completed his army service in 1927, and by 1929 he and his family were once again living in Farnhill, at 7 The Arbour.

The move from Skipton back to the village may have been prompted by Walter Thornton's deteriorating health, as he died on the 4th October 1929 and was buried in Kildwick churchyard on the 8th.

On 5th October 1930 John and Carrie's final child, Clifford, was born. He was baptised in Farnhill Methodist Chapel a month later.

In 1931 Gladys Thornton, aged 9 or 10, took part in one of the theatrical performances that were often staged in the basement school room of Farnhill Chapel.

Note: The photograph of the event shown above shows not only Gladys Thornton but also children of three other Farnhill WW1 Volunteers: Kathie Kitson, daughter of Albert Kitson; Winnie Smith, daughter of Ben Thornton Smith; and Doris and Norman Ward, children of William Ward.

By the time the register was taken to enable WW2 ration cards to be issued in September 1939, the family were living at 15 Starkey Lane, Farnhill, and John was employed – once again – as a boatman. The house move had taken place in 1934 but quite when John resumed his former occupation is not known.

Keith Bunnett, who lived in the village during WW2, remembers the two Thornton boys living in Starkey Lane. He recalls that John operated a barge on the canal but believes that he gave it up in 1941.

In 1944 Gladys Thornton married Jack Gaskell. The couple set up home with Jack's family at Bridge House, Kildwick.

In 1949 Charlie Thornton married Mabel Binns. They set up home at 3 Spring Gardens, Cowling.

In 1955 Clifford Thornton married Mollie Smith. They set up home at 8 Jacques Grove, Silsden.

John Robert Thornton died, of heart failure, at home, on the 31st July 1959, at the age of 64. He was cremated at Skipton crematorium and his name entered in the Book of Remembrance.

Postscript

After John's death, Carrie Thornton continued to live at 15 Starkey Lane until she died on 11th November 1975.

All three of John and Carrie's children had children of their own and it is likely that there are descendants still living in the local area.
