

From Farnhill to the Front

A commemoration of the lives of the 68 men from the village who volunteered to serve in the armed forces in WW1, and whose names were recorded on the Roll of Honour created by Farnhill Parish Council in February 1916.







During 2017 and 2018 the Farnhill WW1 Volunteers Project, with support from the Heritage Lottery Fund and Kildwick & Farnhill Institute, set out to research the lives of these 68 men – before, during, and after the Great War.

Sidney Biggs joined the navy in September 1914, on his 18th birthday and was aboard HMS Cochrane during the Battle of Jutland.

A keen and talented footballer, Walter Dawson worked as a wool and weaving overlooker at Woodrow's Mill in Junction.
